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Firearm Storage and Safety

Many Americans own firearms as a way to protect their home, family, property and even their businesses. Given the recent incidents of gun violence and mishandling and storing of firearms, the National Crime Prevention Council started a new movement to educate people about firearm safety and storage. It is known as the "Safe Firearms Storage Campaign."

According to the National Crime Prevention Council's website, this campaign encourages gun owners to safely secure their firearms when not in use and to prevent them from being easily used or stolen. There are a variety of different locking and storage options available to firearm owners. Some options include:

- Trigger locks
- Cable locks
- Gun storage cases
- Lock boxes
- Locking safes

Finally, if you have children, it is important to educate them. Start a dialogue with them about what to do if they find or come in contact with a gun. Suggested tips and talking points could be:

- Walk away and tell a parent if your friend shows you his/her parent's gun.
- Tell an adult immediately if you see a

gun on someone or in their backpack.

- Tell a trusted adult if you hear a girl or boy say that he or she is going to bring a gun to school.
- Follow these four steps if they find or come in contact with a gun:
- Stop
- Don't touch
- Get away
- Tell an adult
- Talk to them about why a gun can be dangerous.

Many people own a firearm and we all must play a role in preventing firearm thefts, unintentional injuries, accidental shootings or other gun-related incidents. The National Crime Prevention Council and the Whittier Police Department encourages you to share this campaign with friends, family, co-workers and other community members to encourage safe and secure firearm storage practices.





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

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National Origin Protection Expanded

On July 1, 2018, the definition of "national origin" under the Fair Employment and Housing Act ("FEHA") expands increasing the number of protected employees; restricting English-only and English-proficiency requirements; and limiting employers' actions regarding immigration status.

The FEHA prohibits employers and labor organizations with five or more employees from discriminating, harassing, or retaliating against employees and job applicants based on protected characteristics including "national origin." National origin now includes actual or perceived characteristics such as:

(1) physical, cultural, or linguistic characteristics associated with a national origin group;

(2) marriage to or association with persons of a national origin group;

(3) tribal affiliation;

(4) membership in or association with an organization identified with or seeking to promote the interests of a national origin group;

(5) attendance or participation in schools, churches, temples, mosques, or other religious institutions generally used by persons of a national origin group; and

(6) a name that is associated with a national origin group. Thus, employees national origin group could include a country (e.g., Mexico), a former country (e.g., Yugoslavia), or a place closely associated with an ethnic group but is not a country (e.g., Kurdistan).

The new restrictions also prohibit height and weight requirements disproportionately affecting members of a national origin group even if related to the job and justified by business necessity.

English-Only Policies

In order to implement workplace English-only rules, employers must establish the language restriction is a "business necessity" with an overriding business purpose related to safe and efficient business operations. Business convenience or customer or coworker preference is not sufficient. Where a legitimate reason exists for a language restriction, employees must receive notice of the specific circumstances and times when the restriction applies. Note, however, language restrictions may not apply during employees' non-working time such as breaks and lunches.

Inquiries into Immigration Status

The new rules confirm employers may not inquire into applicants' or employees' immigration status unless required by federal law. Under the federal Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 ("IRCA"), employers must verify work eligibility using federal Form I-9. However, any inquiry not authorized by IRCA, or another federal law, may violate the FEHA regulations. Moreover, the new regulations specify employers may not take adverse action against employees who update or attempt to update personal information based on a change of name, social security number, or employment documents. Therefore, since IRCA prohibits knowingly hiring or continuing to employ an "unauthorized alien," employers may find themselves in a difficult situation where employees provide new identifying information.

What this means for employers.

Employers must always tread carefully when making comments or taking action related to protected characteristics. With this expanding definition of national origin, employers must review existing policies, employee handbooks, job ap plications, and job descriptions, to ensure compliance with these new rules.


